I taught at the University of Leicester from 1972–2003. I was a Senior Lecturer and Director of the Sir Norman Chester Centre and the Centre for Research into Sport and Society. The CRSS was ranked in the top six sports research centres in the world.

I was a visiting professor at the University of Chester 2004–09, teaching postgraduate students in the sociology of sport. I have taught and published in a wide range of subject areas, the principle one being the sociology of sport. However, since retirement I have concentrated on figurational theory with a particular focus on Elias's involvement and detachment thesis. In the course of my career I have lectured and conducted seminars in 21 countries and given numerous television, radio and newspaper interviews. I taught for four years on European Masters Sports Management programme (MEMOS). I have represented the International Olympic Committee as keynote speaker at a conference in Dubai 2002.
